

Pioneer Journal of May 13, 1909: PIPE TO CEMETERIES

Having agreed to lay a suitable pipe from the nearest city water main to the two cemeteries, the village council on Tuesday met and placed an order for the necessary pipe to carry the water to the cemeteries.

The order for the pipe was placed through A. M. Baumbach, who, however, declined to give the purchase price for publication. He stated that the price was very low indeed.

In all 5,000 feet of pipe was ordered. Some of it was 4 inch pipe and the rest was of smaller size, ranging from three quarters of an inch up to an inch and a half, the larger pipe will be used to carry the water to the cemeteries and the smaller pipe will be used to carry the water to the various parts of the cemeteries. The village will pay for laying the pipe to the cemeteries, but the cemetery associations will pay whatever it costs to distribute the pipes at the cemeteries.

Pioneer Journal of June 17, 1909: MOST OF IT IS IN

Two thirds of the piping in the cemeteries is completed and the remainder will be put in today if the fittings which have been ordered arrive. The Catholic cemetery and the new part of the Protestant cemetery have been supplied with water for the past week, and it is expected that the old part will also have the city water the last of the week.

In installing the pipe it was found that some of the fittings were lacking and the work could not go on without them. these were ordered immediately and ought to get here today.

Pioneer Journal of September 9, 1909: TAG, YOU'RE IT.

The Ladies of the Cemetery Association have completed arrangements for a tag day to be held in this city a week from Saturday on Sept. 18th. Tags will be sold on that day and the funds derived from the sale will be used by the association in making repairs and beautifying the cemetery

The ladies went to considerable expense this summer when they installed the city water in the cemetery and while that is of course paid for, they desire to have other money in the treasury with which to keep up the grounds and defray other expenses.

A number of Wadena's beautiful young ladies will sell the tags and every true citizen can show his appreciation of the efforts made by the ladies in buying one or several of the tags. Don't try to resist when you are pinned in a corner by one of the fair tag sellers who insists on tagging you. Just dig down in your jeans and help the good work along as well as you can. There will be no fixed price which you will be compelled to pay, but you are at liberty to donate any amount which you choose.

The Wadena cemetery is a credit to the town and this fact is due solely to the untiring efforts of the cemetery association and the staunch support given them by the citizens of Wadena. It is certain that they will receive the cooperation of all on tag day and the sale of tags ought to net them a goodly sum.
